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## Study Questions: Made on Purpose for a Purpose

Question 1: Discovering Your God-Given Purpose

**Read:** Psalm 139:13-16, Jeremiah 29:11-13, Isaiah 43:1-7

How does understanding that God formed you with intention and purpose before birth change your perspective on your current circumstances? What steps can you take to discover the specific purpose God has designed you for?

Question 2: Encountering God Personally

**Read:** Acts 9:1-19, Exodus 3:1-15, 1 Samuel 3:1-10

Paul's purpose was revealed through a personal encounter with Jesus. Examine these three biblical encounters with God. What similarities do you notice in how God revealed Himself and His purposes to these individuals? How might God be trying to reveal your purpose through personal encounters with Him?

Question 3: Redeeming Your Past for God's Glory

**Read:** Romans 8:28-30, Genesis 50:15-21, 2 Corinthians 5:17-21

Paul's former life as a persecutor became part of his powerful testimony. Joseph's suffering led to salvation for many. How has God used difficult circumstances or past mistakes in your life for good? What areas of your past do you still need to surrender to God's redemptive purpose?

Question 4: The Necessity of Solitude with God

**Read:** Mark 1:35-39, Luke 5:16, Matthew 14:22-23

Paul went to Arabia rather than immediately connecting with the apostles. Jesus consistently withdrew to solitary places to pray. What obstacles prevent you from spending consistent time alone with God? Create a practical plan for incorporating regular solitude with God into your weekly routine.

Question 5: Leaving a Legacy of Faith

Read: Hebrews 11:1-12:2, 2 Timothy 1:3-7, Deuteronomy 6:4-9

Paul's transformation caused people who had never met him to praise God. What kind of spiritual legacy are you currently building? Identify three specific ways you can intentionally invest in others to create a ripple effect of faith that extends beyond your lifetime.
